ANCHORS AWEIGH

H.H. BIERMANN 1932/33 #610. Hugo Hendrik, better known as HH, passed away 27th March. As past Chief of the S.A. Navy as well as past Chief of the S.A. Defence Force HH received a high profile funeral service attended by a number of retired Chiefs of the S.A. Navy as well as the present Chief of the S.A. Navy. After the service his coffin was borne away on the traditional gun carriage by the S.A. Navy. After G.B. served as a Cadet in the British Merchant Navy until 1938 when transferred to the Maritime Department of the S.A.R.& H. 1938 commissioned as a Sub-Lieutenant in the RNVR war reserve. 1946 appointed Lieutenant Commander, S.A. Navy Permanent Force. 1952 Naval attaché, London, Rank, Commander 12/52 Naval and Marine Chief of staff. Rank, Commodore. 1957 promoted to Rear-Admiral. 1965 promoted to Vice Admiral. Chief of the Navy and Commander, Maritime Defence, S.A. Defence Forces. 1972 promoted to Admiral. Appointed as Chief of the S.A.D.F. 1976 retired from the S.A.D.F. Since retirement served on the boards of: St Dunstons, N.S.R.I., Sandock-Austral, Trust Bank, K.F. Albrecht & Co, Suiderland Ontwikkelings Korporasie, Gilbeys Distillers & Vintners, Sunnyside Travel Bureau, Pretoria. Patron of the G.B. War Memorial Fund. HH was described as “The father of the modern South African Navy”. Served with distinction in WWII and South Africa subsequently, Admiral Biermann SSA SD OBE.

On the recommendation of the British Admiralty, the then Lieutenant-Commander H. H. Biermann, an officer in the South African Naval Forces [SANF], was appointed an Officer of the Military Division of the Order of the British Empire [OBE] “for distinguished service during the invasion of Southern France.” What he actually did to earn this decoration was “outstanding work in the reopening of key Mediterranean harbours” [particularly Marseilles harbour].

The Star of South Africa [SSA] “for exceptionally meritorious military service”. This decoration was replaced by the Order of the Star of South Africa in 1975 and the Admiral wore that decoration subsequently. [Post nominal was still SSA]

The Southern Cross Decoration [SD]. He received the first Southern Cross Decoration to be awarded. Instituted in 1975 it was for "outstanding service of the highest order and utmost devotion to duty in time of peace or war".

The Grand Cross Almirante Guillermo Brown by Argentina.

The Grand Cross of the Order of Infante Dom Henrique by Portugal.

K.A. SNOW 1950/51. Reported the sad passing of Ken in our February newsletter. Subsequently a Service of Thanksgiving was held for Ken in Westminster Abbey in London and his ashes were interned in the Cloisters.

B.D. COQUELLE 1965 #2261. Born in Benoni on 25th March 1947. Went to boarding school in Kimberly from the age of six. Educated at Kimberly Boys Prep. and matriculated from in 1964. Played 'Craven Week' rugby and 'Nuffield Week' cricket whilst at school. Joined Safmarine in 1966 as a junior navigation officer and served for three years on bulk carriers, tankers and general cargo vessels. Resigned in 1969 as a result of failing an eye test prior to writing 2nd officer's exam. Joined Quinton Hazell Superite as a sales rep and over the next ten years occupied various management positions in different subsidiaries within their stable. This was followed by a three year stint with Trico Windscreen Wiper Blades as marketing manager, where after he joined a friend, in his newly formed business, Autoquip, as general manager for Johannesburg. A year later, he and his friend bought out the then major shareholder, Parts Centre. In 1987 the group listed on the J.S.E. to take advantage of the listings boom and to re-finance the business. It listed on the very same day that Wall Street crashed. In 1988 his friend emigrated to Australia and Bruce became MD. In early 2000 the decision was taken to delist the company. In February 2008 Bruce relocated from Johannesburg to Gordon's Bay and commuted to head office in Johannesburg on a bi-weekly basis. Bruce passed away on the 7th.JANUARY 2012 after a long illness and is survived by his wife, Dawn, his four children.

C.W. DICKSON 1950/51 #1644. After leaving Bothie Claude joined Shaw Savill Line operating between S.A. and Australia and then U.K. and Australia/New Zealand. Since he was desperate to follow his brothers to the Bothie, he completed his apprenticeship at the tender age of 18 years and 3 months and was not eligible to write his Second Mates ticket. The Company sent him home for an extended leave and when requested to join a ship some three months later, decided not to take up their offer. Married Dulcie in Cape Town and subsequently emigrated to the U.K in 1976. Took up various positions as Fire and Safety Consultant in the Petro-chemical industry specialising in the Fire and Safety design for Oil and Gas rigs which involved travel to various locations including back to S.A (Mossel Bay Gas Rig); on to Montreal (Hibernia Gas rig) in Canada and then to Glasgow, Aberdeen, and London. Finally retired on health grounds in 1998 and lived in Reading, Berkshire. Deceased 07/02/2012.

O.D. WALLANDER 1957/58. Olaf was born on 12th November 1940. He lived with his parents on a small farm in Somerset West when he enrolled at the SANC General Botha, Gordon's Bay in 1957. Left Bothie to help his parents on the farm. Olaf met his future wife, Patricia soon after school, and they were married until she passed away ± 2005. Olaf was absolutely heartbroken and never got over her death. Olaf was always a fun guy and all his life he was full of humour. He wrote to Dave Mac Callum: "My favourite is still our first day when we were on the road learning to dress off and Davis got us to count from the left, so it went 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 then laughter. Then we started again and by the time we got to 7 or 8 we were howling. What was funny was the different voice pitches. We must have tried a good 6 or 7 times but it just got worse. So Davis made us Bothie hop to the end of the Starboard Roadway and back, but it was useless. I think we were even laughing while we were hopping, and yes those were great times, and even the shitty ones were great. My parents had lost our farm and I had to leave and find a job and I was really pissed off. I know I could write a book on my time spent there and I wouldn't have traded one day for how to become a man overnight. Thanks for the memories. Love you guys. Olaf."

Malcolm Clark, Olaf's Old Salt wrote: "Was sorry to read of the passing over the side of Olaf who was a member of our Naval Association in Victoria on Vancouver Island. As far as background is concerned I know he only served a year at the Bothie and left due to financial implications. He immigrated to Canada in the early sixties and was involved in the petroleum industry. His wife Patricia

predeceased him and there are two children remaining. He passed away on March 15th 2012 and I sent a note of condolence to the family from the cadets of your year.”

Personal friends of the Wallander’s from Canada wrote: “I just wanted to reflect back on his most interesting life dating back to the early 70's when I first met him and Pat. We all lived in Deep Cove at the time where Olaf worked hard at his auto repair shop. Olaf had a love of cars and started collecting classic Studebakers at that time. We used to enjoy weekends up at Mixal Lake where the kids, Karin & Gavin, and their St. Bernhard, Nancy, had such fun times with the rest of us. He and Pat made many interesting moves from there over the years, starting a hobby farm in Sechelt and then over to Comox where they set up a store, always making new friends wherever they went. It was a sad day when we lost dear Pat and it must have been an empty time in Olaf's life after that. I will always remember him as a hard working, creative and lovable guy. May he rest in peace.”

A personal Bothie friend of Olaf since they were at nursery school together (Lindsay Sargeant) wrote: “Olaf was extremely neat, always sweeping the street in front of his shop. He built his lovely home by hand personally, and had a stream from outside flowing right through his living room. Olaf was born on the 12th November 1940. He and Patricia were married in February 1963 and moved to Durban where their children were born. Their first child, Karin, was born in December 1693 and their son Gavin, arrived two years or so later. The family set off to Canada when Gavin was still tiny, first to Calgary, and then they moved to Vancouver Island where they owned and ran a general store called “Headquarters”. There was a brief period when they returned to South Africa and lived in Durbanville for a couple of years, during which time Karin came out from Canada and got married on top of Table Mountain! Thereafter they remained in Canada with the occasional visit to South Africa. In his lifetime he must have had at least 90 motor cars including all the ones he restored (Morris Minors, MG’s, Volkswagens, Mercedes Benz, Studebakers, and a Ford Mustang that we know of!) Despite good and rough times we kept in touch over a span of 65 years.”

Memorial Service: Rear Admiral Ken Snow CB and The Interment of Ashes in the Cloisters Westminster Abbey Saturday 17th March 2012

The Memorial Service for Ken Snow (GB 50/51) was held. Barbara and I together with Doug Wrathmall (56/57) Chris Nash (61/62) & Anne, Dr Adair Butchins (50/51) sadly Adair's wife was recovering from a serious back operation and could not attend, duly represented the GBOBA on the day. Some 300 attended the service followed by a reception in Up School the Hall of Westminster School.

The Very Reverend Dr John Hall, Dean of Westminster, conducted the service. The service sung by the Westminster Abbey Special Service Choir conducted by James O'Donnell Organist and Master of the Choristers.

Her Majesty's Lord –Lieutenant of Greater London and Lady Brewer were received at the Great West Door by the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.

A Tribute was read by Ken's son Rear Admiral Christopher Snow CBE DL who spoke very eloquently of his father's life with particular reference not only to his time in the Royal Navy but how proud he was of his South African heritage and of his training received as a cadet on the Nautical College General Botha, something which stood him in great stead in his later life. Ken and Pam continued over the years to enjoy many visits to South Africa where he sadly passed away last December.

As always, it is only on occasions as above that one really gets to learn about the life and times of the deceased. A brief synopsis: after GB 50/51 where Ken was Chief Cadet Captain and the last winner of the Kings Gold Medal, Royal Naval

College Dartmouth, into the RN serving through to commanding minesweeper HMS Kirkliston 1962, frigate HMS Llandaff 1970, frigate HMS Arethusa 1979 also Squadron Commander and as the last Capt of the carrier HMS Hermes 1983. Ken served in the Admiralty as Dep.Ass.Chief of Staff 84-87. Following retirement Ken joined the staff of Westminster Abbey. He was Receiver General and Chapter Clerk 87-98 and Deputy High Bailiff 98-2008. His final duty being the Funeral of Princess Diana Princess of Wales. The profile of Receiver General included in this newsletter.

OFFICE OF RECEIVER GENERAL AND CHAPTER CLERK OF WESTMINSTER ABBEY

Historically the Receiver General collected all the rents from Abbey properties and estates, combining in a single role duties which in monastic times were assigned to more than one official. The first contract or 'patent' for a Receiver General dates from 1544 and from then on the names of all those who have held that office are known. The Chapter Clerk was a trained lawyer responsible for a wide range of administrative duties for the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.

The Receiver General today holds the most senior lay position in the Abbey. He is responsible to the Dean and Chapter for the control and running of all administration, financial, and protocol matters, is in overall charge of lay personnel, is responsible for the security of the Abbey and precincts, and is the co-ordinator of all affairs concerning the Abbey's secular life. For over a century the offices of Receiver General and Chapter Clerk have been combined. The Chapter Clerk acts as chief executive of the Chapter, responsible for agendas and minutes at their meetings. The Receiver General generally acts as Registrar of the Abbey, recording all baptisms, marriages, and burials.

Ken Snow was the twenty-ninth Receiver General since the re-foundation of the Abbey as a Collegiate Church in 1560.

GAUTENG BRANCH NEWS

The Gauteng branch held its Annual Commissioning Day luncheon at the Golden Harvest Restaurant in Strydom Park on Sunday 18 March. This was a week later than previously advertised as we had difficulty in obtaining a suitable venue. The whole question of venues has become a worrisome one as, by the nature of things, we require a private room, a decent ambience and a good menu, and finding all three in one venue is not easy and is invariably expensive. Normal restaurants, which are prepared to accept a large group, are invariably noisy and crowded and so, for the last number of years, we have been using club houses and retirement village dining rooms. This gives rise to another problem in that as soon as we find one that we like and use it more than once, either the members or the Body Corporate complain that we are taking over, at the expense of the members or residents, and we have to move on. This was the case with the Golden Harvest for the date that we requested, but because we have proved such good long-standing customers and have residents on the property the Caterer intervened and we were granted the use of this pleasant venue. Our membership is at the moment 106 ex-cadets and notices were sent out to each of them. Sixteen attended and seventeen sent their apologies. The sixteen who came along were bolstered by wives, friends and family and the final number who sat down to a delightful lunch was thirty-one. It was a beautiful day, the caterer had pulled out all the stops. The service was, as usual, good and the excellent meal proved value for money. Messages of goodwill were received from the Cape Town and Australian Branches and read out. A good time was had by all and the last stragglers left at 16h30, after a very sociable lunch. Frank Redgment (1939/40) received the prize for the oldest Old Salt present and Henri Fouche (1968) the prize for the youngest Chum. It was none-the-less a disappointing turn out for such a large Branch, particularly after a lot of time and effort had been put in to organising the event. There are many reasons for our declining attendance, which reached a high of 70 ex-cadets when the meal was free and sponsored, and now has dropped to the present paltry 15. One of the reasons is cost. This last meal cost R140 per head, as against R70 when we first started using the Golden Harvest, and attendance has dropped as the cost has risen. We can and have gone to cheaper places, but then we get complaints about the food, crowd or ambience. It seems that our ex-cadets want privacy, top-class food and a pretty ambience, but want it at steak house prices and the two ideas are just not compatible. There is also a perception held by some that the two annual functions are simply a "get-together for Ivor Little's '50s friends". This is patently untrue, as it will be seen that at the last luncheon the attendees spanned the period 1939 to 1968. It is a perception and perceptions are hard to change, if those holding them do not themselves attend. However, it is a fact that the large majority of our members are from the decade of the '50s as this was the *Botha's* heyday and I think that the same holds true for the other branches as well. Those present at the luncheon understood the problems that our Branch is facing and it was agreed that we are reaching a crisis point if we wish to continue in existence. Because of a lack of interest and fixed pensions, we are quite simply pricing ourselves out

of business, if we continue in the same vein. It was agreed to appoint Rene Poerner, Henri Fouche, Ivor Little and Tony Hunter as a steering committee to try and solve the problem by coming up with new ideas to try and re-awaken interest amongst ex-cadets. An Interesting Snippet from Gavin Durell

A 36 ton anchor belonging to a historic ship, once the world's largest, has been transported by Wilhelmsen Ships Service from Gujarat and has just arrived in Hong Kong, to be placed as the centrepiece in the new Hong Kong Maritime Museum. Wilhelmsen Ships Service Hong Kong was approached by the Norwegian ambassador in Guangzhou in early February to arrange the transportation of the anchor of the Jahre Viking/Seawise Giant which was scrapped in India this year.

The ULCC (Ultra Large Crude Carrier) was the world's longest ship until she was beached to be broken up after 35 years afloat. Gifted to the Hong Kong Maritime Museum by an anonymous donor this anchor will recognise the involvement of Norwegian shipping in Hong Kong waters since the early 19th century. The transportation of the anchor from India to Hong Kong was sponsored by the government of Norway.

Built for Mr CY Tung in 1979 and subsequently sold by his family, the ship was owned and operated by Norwegian shipping interests for the rest of its life.

The anchor of the Jahre Viking/ Seawise Giant, has 20 links of chain, is 7m long in the shank, 4.45m across the flukes and 1.13m thick. This represented a considerable challenge to shift from the beaches of Gujarat to the Government Shipyard in Hong Kong. The India office of Wilhelmsen Ships Service arranged for the purchase, documentation and land transportation of the anchor onboard a 40 foot flat rack container from the scrapyard in Alang to Pipanav port and thereon onboard the Nedloyd Barentz to Hong Kong. The anchor arrived in Hong Kong on 17 June and was transported to the Government Shipyard for storage by Wilhelmsen Ships Service Hong Kong using a crane barge.

GBOBA BURSARY FUND

The draft Annual report was tabled at the Cape Town Branch AGM, as required by the Constitution and substantial discussions and interaction followed in this respect. Further to this a debate took place on the Fund's proposed activities for the coming financial year.

A substantial amount of support for what the Fund had achieved so far and for its proposed activities was expressed, specifically for the proposed joint fund raising event with SOMMSA – The Marine Bursary Golf Day (see Page 14).

The Fund balance stands at R74,487 (dated 3 May 2012). The Fund is committed to payments of R12,000 in June 2012 and a further R24,000 for the existing students next year. The decision will be whether to fund one or two half bursaries next year. The intention of the Management Committee is to draft and approve a 5-year strategic plan. However, this will depend largely on the annual income from donations. A questionnaire will be circulated to all Patrons/donors to gauge the intended level of contributions.

The Committee is seeking assistance from persons or companies prepared to mentor our students.

BOTHIE TERMINOLOGY – By Alan Bole

A Catalogue of Bothie Terminology.

Some time ago, I floated the idea of compiling a 'Dictionary' of terminology as might be given to a new cadet coming to the 'General Botha' i.e. the language, unique to the Institution. Manning refers to it briefly in his book on Captain Legassick. Sadly, as the years pass, memories fade and much of the picturesque jargon is lost. It would need someone to collate this work and I'm sure that many memories could be jogged at Obies meetings and lunches etc. rather than see this interesting language – I'm sure that it has some fancy name – disappear forever. I would be prepared to take on the work myself, but feel that I am too remote to really be in touch with members.

I include here some terms with my idea of their brief explanations, which come to mind:

General Terms

Gwogs: any confectionary, sweets etc.

Tings: A general terms for cigarettes;

Sponsies: To keep cave or to warn of the approach of trouble.

Staff.

Gus: Capt G.V. Legassick – Capt Superintendent of SANC General Botha from 1946 to 1978;

Legs: Mrs Legassick. This came from Legassick rather than as a comment on her anatomy;

'Jock' Frame: Headmaster and teacher of Maths and English;

'Schnoz' du Bois: Afrikaans teacher. Apparently a description of his proboscis;

'Olly' Stokes: Physics teacher – no idea of the origin;

'Chiefie' Prest: Chief Officer. Noted quote "The onus is on you"

'Hydro' Harry Pinn: Second Officer and Navigation Instructor;

'Apples' Aplin: Third Officer;

'Uncle Bob';

'Granny' - Bert Costick: Signals Instructor. The name probably derives from his prowess with the sewing machine making signal flags;

'Tallow' Gough: Seamanship Instructor;

'Nuts' Almond: Electronics Officer;

PTI Smith: trained the boxing team;

'.....': Burser; i/c payday

'.....': Carpenter

'Pop': Night watchman. Roused the "cadet-capstans, batsmen and bugler" 20 minutes before Reveille;

'Padre':

Cadet Hierarchy.

'Chainie': The Chief Cadet Captain. Distinguished by his silver chain and bosun's pipe;

4 Senior Cadet Captains (SCCs): One in charge of each of the four Tops;

7 Junior Cadet Captains (JCCs); One as second in each Top, the 3 remaining had special responsibilities;

Badge Cadets: Cadets with assigned special responsibilities – Sports Store; Band Locker; and Tuck Shop;

'Old Salts': Senior cadets i.e. those in their second year;

'Chums': Junior cadets i.e. those in their first year;

Batmen: a nautical term for 'fags'. Officially employed by a Cadet Captain for general duties but mainly to clean shoes and to attend to ensuring that laundry was sent and collected. It had the advantage of protecting one from being required to perform 'unofficial' duties for other Old Salts.

Organisation.

Watches: each cadet was assigned to either Port or Starboard Watch, with one Watch assigned as Duty Watch on alternate days. This comprised some 50 cadets and was only called out when some major work needed doing. On rare occasions, 'Both Watches' might be called e.g. when a cutter needed to be hauled up on the davits;

'Tops': F'o'c'sle, Foretop, Main Top, and Quarterdeck. Equivalent to 'houses' in ordinary schools and are basic competitive units. Cadets assigned evenly. For minor events, the Duty Top would be called.

'Slack Party': for minor infringements of college rules, ones name would be placed in the Slack Party register. When Slack Party was called, cadets whose names were in the book would turn out and would be assigned minor – usually dirty jobs;

'Clear up Decks': Initial clear up of all areas, first thing in the morning and – before prayers – last thing at night;

'Gangway' and Gangway Duty': The initial reception area. It would be manned by 2 cadets – one senior and one junior – to welcome visitors and enquire after their business and direct them to the appropriate person. It was also the duty of the Senior to ensure that the regular activities of the day took place at the correct times e.g. hoisting and lowering of flags at Sunset when a cadet Captain, a bugler, and 2 cadets would be required. Also, to keep a logbook. If a particular cadet was required for some reason, the junior cadet would proceed with a Bosun's Pipe and call his name, to which the cadet would be required to answer 'Whereaway' when he heard his name called. When one was on Gangway Duty, one was excused school. It was a long day.

'Mess Deck' and 'Mess Cooks': The former was the dining area, where meals were served and eaten. The duty 'Mess cooks' were 2 cadets for each table and were assigned weekly to prepare and clear the tables at each meal. A cadet Captain sat at the head of each table. One contentious issue was the division of the butter at breakfast and would cause serious comment if not meticulously divided. Chums and Old Salts were never on the same table at meals;

'Galley Boys': These were Africans who worked in the Galley and who served the food.

‘Sick Bay’: A number of rooms where sick cadets would be treated for minor ailments;
‘Sick Parade’: The weekly visit by the doctor who would check one Top per week and attend to cadets in the Sick Bay. Cadets would line up and run up to the doctor, shout their number and lower their trousers. The doctor would put 2 fingers in ones mouth with the instruction to say, “aah!” – the other hand went onto ones crotch with the instruction to “Cough!” He was carefully watched to ensure that he didn’t reverse his hands.
